So this year I have personally taken it as a goal for myself and for llan-Lael to explore that empty space where something

ill the moonlight always turn these white-domed sculptures silver at night? Will the clang of hammer on anvil echo up from the studio's forge, while the lively comings and goings of artists fill the property each day until it is fairly electric with creative energy? Will the Quiet Ones—everyone of you who finds an inner peace and solace in the midst of nature—always find room to sit in the chapel that looks west across the tapestries of chaparral, oak woodlands, and passing clouds that stretch almost to the sea?

The Ilan-Lael Foundation, created by James and Anne Hubbell 30 years ago, promises that this shall be so.

California has several absolutely unique homes handbuilt by artists; residences and their studios that mirror the energy and creativity of fascinating owners. In Carmel, poet Robinson Jeffers built Tor House and its hawk tower by dragging each stone up from the rocky shore. In Alta Loma, the Sam Maloof House and adjoining workshop reflects the famous woodworker's fascination with outstanding arts and crafts traditions.

And in Santa Ysabel, the Hubbells' home and 40 surrounding acres—despite still serving as a private home—has taken another major step toward becoming a center for the arts and culture that, as James says, "...celebrates nature and the aesthetic of the built environment for its ability to help us see ourselves and our world in new ways."

The new llan-Lael Center is now more than a third complete. When finished in 2015, the U-shaped cluster of buildings around a courtyard will provide space for the foundation's work, as well as archives and space for other programs, such as small group retreats. You can get a rough, but real, feel for its promising future at this year's Open House. And meanwhile, the rest of the property has never looked better.

llan-Lael means "a tree that belongs to God"—the name and symbol bring the spiritual and physical together much like a tree that has its roots in the ground and its branches in the sky. In 30+ years, what have we accomplished? Very much.

In our first 10 years we created Kidzwalk, published Hidden Leaves, sponsored art exhibits.

In our second ten, we brought the school buildings of Colegio La Esperanza in Tijuana to fruition, using the hands of all of you, our volunteers. Soil & Soul workshops began and would soon evolve in our Pacific Rim Parks parallel mission.

Our third decade saw us recovering from the fire thanks to a community outpouring of support.

And now, the fourth decade? We're in a time of transitioning a private home into a public place. We're finding our role, both here at the property and in the world at large. One thing is certain: we will continue, as James implores, "...to explore that empty space where something new may be born."

ne of the goals of Ilan-Lael is to never be limited to the confines of the Santa Ysabel property—as beautiful and enticing as it is! Recently, at Ilan-Lael's Conversations On Beauty at the Mingei International Museum, James unveiled his hope that the Centennial Celebration for Balboa Park can be much more that simply a block party on a giant scale. What if it kicks off a five-year celebration of San Diego's relationship with the entire "string of pearls necklace" of countries on the Pacific Rim?

In a letter to the Mayor, co-signed by the legendary oceanographer Walter Munk of Scripps Research Institute, the two write:

"We believe that we have been

given a special gift, to live beside this magnificent Pacific Ocean; that we are not only citizens of San Diego, but also of an emerging Pacific Rim community that will prove as important as the

economic culture. We also believe that the one hundred year anniversary of Balboa Park can be of great significance to the city and region. We would like to propose that Balboa's anniversary be used to revive some of the visions and optimism that was here in the beginning...to use Balboa Park at the start of planning San Diego's 250th birthday, coming
